Some people with heart failure can experience pain or discomfort towards the end of their life. They should be assessed using a pain scale. Pain-relieving medicines can be used to relieve pain and discomfort; this can include opioid (eg morphine) and non-opioid medicines (paracetamol).

Symptoms can develop quickly (acute heart failure) or gradually over weeks or months (chronic heart failure). When to get medical advice. See a GP if you experience persistent or gradually worsening symptoms of heart failure. Call 999 for an ambulance or go to your nearest A&E department as soon as possible if you have sudden or very severe symptoms.

Taking care of somebody with heart failure should not be as work-intensive as taking care of somebody who has had (for instance) a severe stroke, or dementia. So don ' t let it become all-consuming. Most people with stable heart failure can fix a simple meal, get the mail, go to the bathroom, or even do light laundry on their own.

Effective Caregiving for a Loved One With Heart Failure

'The key thing is to look after yourself well, and always phone your GP or heart failure team if your symptoms change or worsen,' says BHF nurse Lucy Martin. 'In fact, call your GP or heart failure team if you have any concerns about your medication or care - they are there to help you.' Your GP is qualified to answer any questions you might have.
